- A series of 129 Catechises given by Pope John Paul II looking at the human person, love, the holiness of the body and the true meaning of human sexuality.
- He sketches a "Total Vision of Man" and asks
- How are we to live especially in the light of marriage and celibacy
- How are we to understand the Encyclical Humanae Vitae



What was Fr. Karol Wojtila's fundamental vision?

"As a priest I realized this very early. I felt almost an inner call in this direction. It is necessary to prepare young people for marriage, it is necessary to teach them love. Love is not something that is learned, and yet there is nothing else as important to learn! As a young priest I learned to love human love. This has been one of the fundamental themes of my priesthood my ministry in the pulpit, in the confessional, and also in my writing. Who Are We?

- Who were we before sin Original Man

Self Gift & Communion

- Being a person means striving towards self-realisation.
 This can only be achieved "through a sincere gift of self."
- The model for this interpretation is God himself as Trinity;
 as a "Communion of Persons".
- To say that man is created in the image and likeness of God means that man is called to "exist" for others, to become a gift" (John Paul II)
- The call to "self gift" is for everyone whatever our vocation since the primary human vocation is to Love.



What does it mean that "the man and his wife were naked, yet they felt no shame"?

They saw God's image in one another and their only concern was to love each other.

"That original nakedness, mutual and at the same time not weighed down by shame, expresses this interior freedom of man.

At the root of their nakedness is the interior freedom of the gift – the disinterested gift of oneself."

The Truth and The Lies

- Human sexuality points to the deepest truth about who we are.
- God's plan for sexuality is "symbolic". Satan's plan is "diabolic" he is the "father of lies". Our bodies speak a language and we can speak either the truth or lies.
- We experience ourselves now in a disordered way. We can look at another and focus only upon their sexual values, failing to see the other "person" in their entirety.



Unity v Disunity

- In God everything is designed to be "whole" or "united": heaven and earth, body and soul, spirituality and sexuality, sacredness and sensuality, masculinity and femininity.
- Individually we are still one unity body and soul; we were wounded by original sin but not corrupted.
- However, through sin our experience of ourselves is often disordered; thus we find it difficult to perceive of ourselves as a whole "person" in our combined bodily and spiritual reality.
- We experience the same difficulty when we "look" at others.
 We judge and lust instead of looking always with love.



Dualism

- This experience of ourselves expresses itself in dualism. Dualism is at the root of many heresies.
- A dualistic approach in the sexual sphere constantly expresses itself in two extremes.
- We can deny our sensuality and our "bodiliness". We repress our sexuality. We become "prudish".
- Or we ignore our "spiritual reality" and indulge our sexuality in an uninhibited and permissive way.
- History reveals the pendulum swing between these two positions.





How Do We Live?

- When we do not perceive God or thereby ourselves in truth we lack inner peace and happiness. We can then substitute pleasure for true happiness.
- This leads us to a relentless striving and grasping at life;
 a continual searching for pleasure often at the expense of
 others. This often includes living our sexuality in a disordered
 way. The root of all sin is "doubting" God and his love for us.
- Even if we acknowledge God, our attitude can be
 "How far can I go?" instead of "How deeply can I love?"



Our Hearts and the Heart of God

- In effect Christ says "you have heard the commandment not to commit adultery but the problem is that you desire to commit adultery"
- What Christ is saying is that to be fully "human" as you were created to be, you need to be re-created internally, to be born of the Spirit.
- Through our redemption we can experience a conversion of heart, our subjective or personal desires gradually come into conformity with the commandments.








- "Man cannot stop at putting the heart in a state of continual and irreversible suspicion due to the manifestations of the lust of the flesh...Redemption is in truth a reality, in the name of which man must feel called and called with efficacy" (John Paul II)
- When the human heart is bound in permanent suspicion man is unable to tap into his deepest and yet most real possibilities. He is unable to give voice to "the inner most layers of his potentiality...the ethos of redemption, on the other hand, is based on a close alliance with those layers" (John Paul II)



Positive Impact on Teaching and Learning

Challenges pupils to see the 'Big Picture' on who we are as humans and our anthropology.

Proposes ideas for reflection based on logic/natural law-not imposing rigid ideas

Does not tell pupils what to think but encourages them to think

Explores the relationship between religion and science, demonstrating the knowable intelligibility of the Universe why this is in tune with Christian beliefs.

Interweaves virtues as a key component for our human flourishing.

Can be **used flexibly** in a number of teaching deliveries with the School themselves knowing who best to deliver, how and when.

Does not require RE/RSE/PSHE specialists but "an open mind and an ability to deliver with reason and logic walking alongside the pupils, learning with them".


